Illusions perdues — in english, lost illusions — is a serial novel written by the french writer honoré de balzac between 1837 and 1843. it consists of three parts, starting in provincial france, thereafter moving to paris , and finally returning to the provinces. "the illustrious gaudissart" is a competent of la comedie humaine, part of the parisians in paris section. it really is a delightful work, pure top of his form balzac. the story begins with a description of the importance of the traveling salesman in france in the 1830s.
